# A LETTER FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

THE REV. KRISTI MAULDEN



*In our right minds, we know that transcendence sparks and crackles around us – in a blinding light, and a child's voice, and fire, and tears, and a warmed heart, and a sculpture just down the hill – if we open ourselves to seeing it.* –Michael Gerson

Some of us take faith for granted. It has always been there. We breathed it in as infants, followed the light of it through our childhood. Rebelled against it as teenagers. Fell in love again and again depending on the cycle of our days. Faith is what grounds me. Through faith I have hope for circumstances to change and for hearts to heal. I feel connected to something greater than myself and yet, it is contained within my heart. I do not know who I would be if I did not have this faith.

I know God is real and present in odd little moments. I see God's presence in the faces of children and their abundant curiosity. I feel the reality of God in the commanding beauty of the mountains, the delicacy of a flower and while standing on the shore of the vast ocean waters. Sometimes the presence of God is so palpable that my heart is transfixed by joy and my mind feels lifted out of the common and the mundane. I yearn for this, yet cannot manufacture in any way, when or why they come.

It happened recently, when I was driving to work. Faith and hope pushed their way in again. There were dark clouds and thunder covering downtown Tulsa. I was thinking about what I needed to do and worrying about any number of things. I felt a push to look up and beyond and above the storm there was a rainbow arching from one side of the city to the other. I heard no words but felt laughter like a river running through my spirit. And I knew, with utter conviction, that God had not abandoned us; had not abandoned me.

For all of you who have this faith, it is a gift that is worth sharing. It was given to us by others who carried this hope in their own souls. There are many who have never known it, or have lost it, or who have forgotten it. This season of Lent calls all of us to return to God and reflect on our lives. As you reflect, consider sharing those transcendent experiences with those around you.

## J2A SILENT AUCTION

A heartfelt "Thank you!" to everyone who braved the snow and supported the silent auction. With the uncooperative weather, we made the decision to try enabling virtual bids which allowed others to participate from home, too. Once all payments are collected, your generous support of the J2A class of 9th and 10th graders will have brought in \$9,387. While it was better than we hoped, in light of the weather, we're still nearly \$4,000 off our goal to ensure all J2A youth can participate in Pilgrimage, regardless of financial need.

The Spiritual Pilgrimage is a life changing experience for our youth. In the words of Ashley Haggard, a youth minister in Little Rock, AR and former Trinity parishioner, "Now that I'm half a lifetime away from my pilgrimage, I look back at that moment as the fork in the road of my faith journey. Without being conscious of it, those moments of quiet prayer in the French countryside, and of wonder at the depth and breadth of our faith, would set me on a path that I am still following today...This vocation is not one I saw in my future when I set off for Europe at 16. It's not one I saw in my future at 20. But, through my pilgrimage, and J2A experience as a whole, I learned how to look inside myself, to look to scripture and to prayer, to find my place in the world. And I came to find that I am called to walk alongside other young people as they discover their own faith journeys."

# BECOME A KAIROS VOLUNTEER

Kairos Prison Ministry shares the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to incarcerated men, women, youth and their families. Kairos sprang from the Cursillo movement and is supported by a diverse group of volunteers from all Christian churches working together to fulfill Christ's call to action in Matthew 25:36 'I was in prison and you visited me.' The Kairos full program involves an extensive Weekend time along with regular gatherings through Continuing Ministry. Kairos has been called the best example of the early church in existence today.

If you feel God's call to minister to the incarcerated or the family member of someone incarcerated, as a part of a Kairos team, contact Libbye at (918) 284-7487. Some are called to serve inside the prisons but there are also other opportunities to serve. All Kairos activities are covered with prayer and you can be a part of that prayer effort. During the Inside Weekends, a prayer chain is put together in links and encircles the entire gym. The attending residents are astounded that all the links represent someone praying for them! Your contribution of prayers is vital to our program.

We distribute 3000 to 5000 dozen cookies during Kairos Inside weekends, showing Jesus' immeasurable love in a tangible way by providing at least one dozen cookies to everyone in the prison (inmates and staff) from loving Christians. All Kairos activities are funded by donations. If you would like to support this ministry by your donation, you can purchase meal tickets for \$10 each to provide a meal for an imprisoned participant. Make your check payable to Kairos Oklahoma (any amount is appreciated!).

A table will be set in the Great Hall each Sunday in March to collect cookies, sell meal tickets, and sign the Prayer Chain for the Spring Inside Weekend at Mabel Bassett Correctional Center for women.

# MUSIC AT TRINITY

## 18TH ANNUAL THOMAS MATTHEWS MEMORIAL CONCERT

There are many special musical events coming up this spring at Trinity. On Friday, May 10<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm organist Chelsea Chen will play the Eighteenth Annual Thomas Matthews Memorial Concert. Ms. Chen is the Organist and Artist in Residence at Coral Edge Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. She is internationally renowned for her concerts of "rare musicality" and "lovely lyrical grandeur," and a compositional style that is "charming" and "irresistible" (Los Angeles Times). The recital is free and a reception will follow in the Great Hall.

On Sunday, June 2<sup>nd</sup>, Pro Musica Tulsæ will present their annual concert of early music with period instruments. Trinity's harpsichord will feature prominently in the concert.

As always, Tuesdays at Trinity continues each week at 12:05pm. This series features a variety of artists performing music for voice, piano, organ, French Horn, the University of Tulsa Capella Chamber Singers, and a preview of Tulsa Opera's "Don Giovanni."

In addition to the music our choir sings each Sunday morning, we have Choral Evensong the first, third and 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of each month. The Trinity Choir will sing these services with the exception of March 31<sup>st</sup> which will be a congregational Evensong. On May 19<sup>th</sup> the combined Trinity Choirs will sing the final Evensong of the season. Many of the Evensong services are preceded by organ recitals at 4:30 p.m. The schedule for this spring is:



# WHAT WILL BE YOUR LEGACY?

Although facing our own mortality can be daunting, there are things we can do to make it less so. Trinity has a Funeral Planning Guide, which can help with making decisions about scripture readings, hymns, and other decisions pertaining to funerals. This Guide will help you plan your funeral so it will be easier for your family, friends, and loved ones. Often when tragedy strikes or death is sudden, families must make arrangements quickly, at a time when they are most vulnerable. Spending some time completing this Guide now can help those you leave behind. Call the church to request your copy, and feel free to speak with Pastor Kristi about any questions you may have.

There is also the question of legacy. There are many ways to consider legacy. One obvious way is to consider how your resources will be distributed after you die. Making a will is a good starting point, and will also ease the burden on your loved ones left to settle your affairs and administer your estate. In fact, page 445 of the Book of Common Prayer tells us that it is "the duty . . . of all persons to make wills." It goes on to say direct the "Minister of the Congregation to instruct the people from time to time about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families" and "of the duty of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods."


The Book of Common Prayer provides further counsel that persons making wills, trusts, or other estate planning instruments are not to neglect, if they are able, "to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses." To that end, we encourage you to consider becoming a member of Trinity's Legacy Society, which is comprised of individuals who have provided for Trinity in some way upon death. This can be done through a bequest in a will or trust of either a set dollar amount or a percentage of the estate or by naming Trinity as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy or retirement plan.

Names of Legacy Society members are permanently inscribed on a plaque in the narthex of the church. Members are also invited to an annual legacy society dinner. This year's Legacy Society Dinner will be held on Tuesday, April 30, in Bishop Brooke chapel. It is a lovely evening with no agenda — other than to say thank you to Legacy Society members. ## Iron Gate on Archer

Iron Gate's board of directors and staff got their first looks inside the new building in February. Iron Gate on Archer is really taking shape, with crews putting the finishing touches on the roof. They have started installing the interior framing and brick work is beginning. Iron Gate's construction team, led by Flintco, began laying the ground work shortly after the groundbreaking ceremony in August.

Iron Gate signed a 99-year lease with Tulsa County in April for the 1.77 acre-lot at the intersection of West Archer and North Frisco. Iron Gate's new 17,000 square foot facility will feature a covered patio, a dedicated grocery pantry, and more storage space. The property is next door to the Day Center for the Homeless and across the street from the new family justice center.

Iron Gate's current facility in the basement of Trinity Episcopal Church is almost 5,000 square feet. The new facility is three times as large as the current space. It will include a dining room that can seat up to 237 guests. The current dining room only seats 88. The new facility will also dramatically increase Iron Gate's storage capacity adding 1,500 square feet of bulk storage and cooler space as well as a new 1,200-square-foot dedicated pantry space.
